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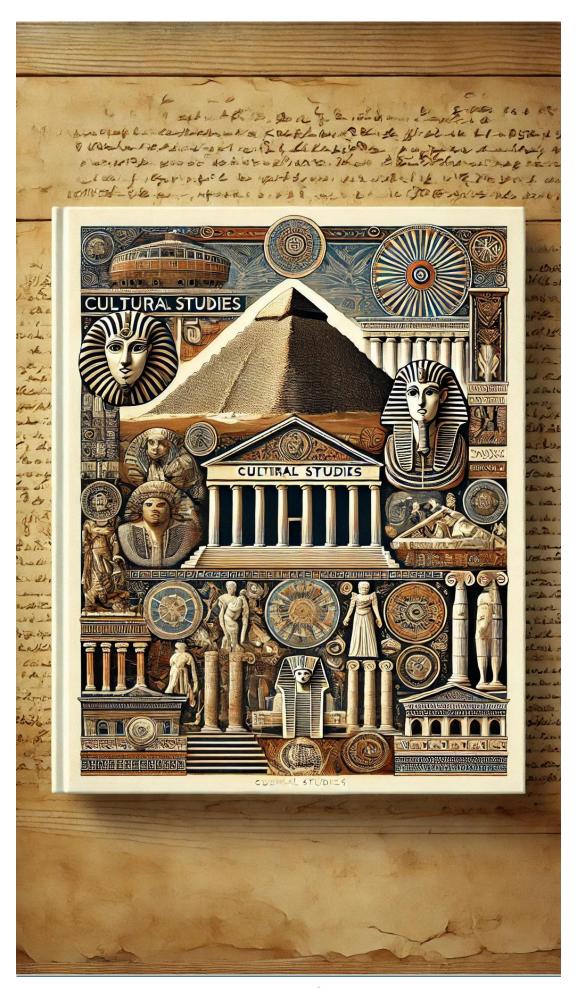

In contrast, the **cyclical concept** of culture posits that cultures go through phases of growth, maturity, and decline, like the life cycle of a living being. This perspective highlights the repetitive nature of cultural development, where certain patterns or values reappear over time.

The **anthropological perspective** offers another view, suggesting that culture is an integral part of human existence, shaping how individuals adapt to their environment. This approach emphasizes that culture is not just an external set of norms or practices, but is deeply embedded in human biology and psychology.

The **axiological concept** of culture focuses on values, arguing that the core of any culture lies in the values it upholds. According to this view, cultural change occurs when the underlying values of a society shift, leading to new practices and norms. Meanwhile, the **formational concept** examines culture through the lens of societal structures, particularly the role of economic and political systems in shaping cultural practices.

In the modern era, the study of culture has become increasingly interdisciplinary, incorporating insights from various fields to provide a more comprehensive understanding. The impact of globalization has further complicated the study of culture, as cultural exchange and hybridization have become more common. As cultures interact, they influence each other in profound ways, leading to both the preservation of certain traditions and the emergence of new cultural forms.
